














This Movement effort built upon Children Now's previous advocacy work with student leaders to ban similar suspensions in middle school.



With more than 2,750 organizational signatures, The Children's Movement has helped millions of kids get or keep access to health insurance, including undocumented kids and former foster youth.












### **Child Welfare**

The Children's Movement has helped enact and preserve critical supports for foster youth and their caregivers.

For example, The Movement garnered more than 2,800 organizational signatures to create and preserve the Family Urgent Response System (FURS), a 24-7 hotline for foster youth and their caregivers.

Since FURS launched, approximately 5,000 requests for support are made annually.

The Federal Census Bureau, the state of California, local counties and cities are developing detailed plans to ensure every Californian is counted starting April 2020.

#### An update regarding the citizenship question

The Supreme Court is expected to issue an expedited ruling – on a Monday this month – on whether the 2020 Census will include the citizenship question. If you want to participate in the rapid response campaign (once a decision is announced), you can use this social media tool kit. You can also follow Hansi Lo Wang, NPR national correspondent, covering the 2020 Census, on Twitter, for regular, detailed updates on federal census issues.

## Medi-Cal is Open to All Young Adults – Help us Get the Word Out!



All CA children, youth, and families need access to health care now and after this public health crisis ends.

It's critical that California continues to ensure children and young people have timely access to the health care they need. Optimal health impacts a child's academic achievement and long-term well-being, but many California children and families are uninsured or lack access to routine check-ups and other preventive health services.

In 2019, there were 334,000 uninsured kids in California. This year, the COVID-19 pandemic and immigration fears due to **policy changes at the federal level** have contributed to a stagnation or, in some cases, a decline in health coverage enrollment, putting the health of children and youth at risk, and exacerbating racial and economic disparities.

After Pro-Kid policies are passed, The Children's Movement has mobilized members to ensure they are implemented in the most effective, equitable way.





In these uncertain political times, we must work together to protect California's immigrants, keep kids and families together, and help everyone understand their rights. Below please find organizations and resources to aid you in protecting immigrant kids and families across our state.

- The National Immigration Law Center has put together <u>helpful resources</u> in English and Spanish to help immigrants and providers navigate privacy concerns around applying for health care under the Affordable Care Act.
- The American Academy of Pediatrics <u>firmly opposes</u> any Department of Homeland Security measure that would separate mothers and children at the border. <u>Their website</u> contains a number of resources to support the health of children.
- The California Immigrant Policy Center offers a variety of fact sheets that detail health and public benefits available to immigrant children. They can be found here.

### Stand Up for Kids: Stop Draconian Budget Cuts Today



As our May newsletter laid out, Governor Newsom's May Revise of the 2024-25 state budget proposed cuts to critical kid's programs, including but not limited to:

- Complete elimination of the Family Urgent Response System (FURS), a 24.
- helpline with I caregivers
- A 45% reduct
- An indefinite clear timeline

Keeping Movement Members Informed on Key Kids' Issues Across the State

#### **Action Needed Around Proposed Draconian Cuts to Kids**

ello TCMers,

Governor Newsom's revision of the 2024-25 state budget proposal, commonly referred to as the May Revise, was released on May 10th. This edition of our newsletter is a deep dive into the May Revise – what was cut, and what Movement members can do over the next few weeks to make sure California's kids aren't left behind during a difficult budget year.

Overall, the proposed cuts across child welfare, child care, home visiting, TK-12 education, mental health, and access to health services are untenable. Yes, it's an extraordinarily difficult budget year in California, but the very last place to look for cuts is our kids. While California ranks in the top nationally when it comes to <a href="mailto:separation">separation</a>. we hover around the national average on per capita spending on kids and rank 35th when it comes to overall child well-belien.

### What does the May Revise propose to cut?

#### Supports for Foster Your

The Administration already threatened the safety of California's foster youth by proposing the elimination of the Family Urgent Response System (FURS, a 24/7 hotline for foster families) in January. FURS funding was not added back into the May Revise. We will continue to leverage this letter signed by over 1.000 Movement organizations to pressure the Governor and Legislature to preserve this critical program.
