SB 1126 (MIN): A BRIEF OVERVIEW

NOVEMBER 1, 2024

LANDSCAPE

- In 2022, in just Los Angeles County, there were 16,023 calls by law enforcement to DCFS. Approximately 52% of those involved domestic violence
- In 2022, according to the same study, there were 1,930 children detained or removed from their families as a result of DV allegations
- For decades, survivor parents have reported this issue as either the most significant or among the most significant issues they are facing

SB 1126 (Min)

- "This bill would provide that the fact that a child-witnessed domestic violence or was present during a domestic violence incident does not require a mandated reporter to report child abuse or neglect."
- Choice to focus upstream to reduce the number of families that enter the system and to avoid harms at the investigation stage

Timeline

- ► <u>February-</u> Introduced by Sen. Dave Min
- April- Vote 4-1 to pass through Senate Public Safety Committee
- May- Pulled from consideration before a vote on the Senate Floor



CONSIDERATIONS FOR THE FUTURE

- There remains a lot of work to do to inform Legislators about this issue, the harm of the mandated reporting system
- Legislators remain wary of reforming mandated reporting and do not fully understand the nature of the system and the harms it inflicts
- There may be potential to address this issue through other avenues/via other mechanisms
